# SINGLE MASTERS PREVIEW

The NEC Wheelchair Singles Masters is unique on the UNIQLLO Wheelchair Tennis Tour and guarantees that the world's eight best men's, women's and quad players must face three of their peers in round-robin competition before the top two players in each of two round-robin groups go forward to the knock-out semi-finals.

It's not unusual for the year-end world No.1 rankings to be decided at the season-ending championships and that will be the case again in the men's singles this year, with Tokito Oda and Alfie Hewett both in contention to end the year as world No. 1 for the first time.

## MEN

Twelve months on from Oda making history at the Singles Masters, when the then 16-year-old beat Hewett in the men's final to succeed the Briton as the youngest winner of the title and deny Hewett the ranking points that would have kept him at world No.1, Oda arrives in Barcelona after another record-breaking season during which he's set more records as the youngest men's champion at both Roland Garros and Wimbledon.

Hewett and Oda have won two Grand Slam and two Super Series titles apiece this year, but whereas Hewett's two Grand Slam titles have come on the hard courts in Australia and

the USA, Oda's performance on the clay at Roland Garros will likely be a source of confidence going into the first Singles Masters to be held on clay in the event's history.

World No.3 Gustavo Fernandez will surely be another to enjoy the surface for this year's Masters as he seeks his first title at the year-end championships. The Argentinian is the only player other than Hewett and Oda to have won a Super Series title this season, while all three of his 2023 singles titles by the start of this month have come on clay.

After making his top 4 debut in July, Martin de la Puente is enjoying his best season to date, with the first two ITF 1 singles titles of his career including

May's Tram Barcelona Open on clay, where he beat Hewett for the very first time. A similar performance as the Masters lands in Spain for the first time would surely be the dream finale for the home favourite.

Of the eight players in this year's men's line-up, Joachim Gerard, the winner of four Singles Masters titles between 2015 and 2019 and former finalist Gordon Reid could also both be challenging for semi-final berths. Takashi Sanada will hope to find the form that saw him take Oda to three sets in the final of the Japan Open, while Takuya Miki replaces Ruben Spaargaren in the men's singles entry and will contest his third successive Singles Masters.



## WOMEN

Diede de Groot begins her bid for a sixth successive Singles Masters women's title after securing a third successive calendar Grand Slam.

Unbeaten in 122 matches, the defending champion's year-end No.1 ranking has long since been secured, but she began 2023 by being taken to three sets by world No. 2 Yui Kamiji in their first three singles finals of the year. Two close sets followed in the final of the Barcelona Open in May, but Kamiji hasn't come close to taking a set off De Groot in their two most recent finals.

It's ten years this year since Kamiji became the only non-Dutch player to win the women's title in 28 previous editions of the Singles Masters, a feat she achieved at the expense of runner-up Jiske Griffioen, who had actually beaten Kamiji in their round-robin group match earlier that week at the 2013 Singles Masters.

A decade later, Griffioen is now a three-time Masters champion herself and she looks likely to come into this year's Masters as the only player other than De Groot to have beaten Kamiji this season.

While De Groot, Griffioen and Kamiji head the challengers

for a place in this year's semi-finals, 2014 Masters champion Aniek van Koot is an ever-present contender to progress beyond the round-robin stage.

Japan's Manami Tanaka makes her Masters debut at the end of a year that started with the world No. 7 reaching the Australian Open semi-finals, while Zhenzhen Zhu and Kgothatso Montjane will both bid to reach the semi-finals for the first time. Montjane came within two points of beating world No.1 De Groot on clay at the French Riviera Open in June.

Dana Mathewson will contest what could be her last Singles Masters, as she intends to retire after the Paris 2024 Paralympics.

## QUADS

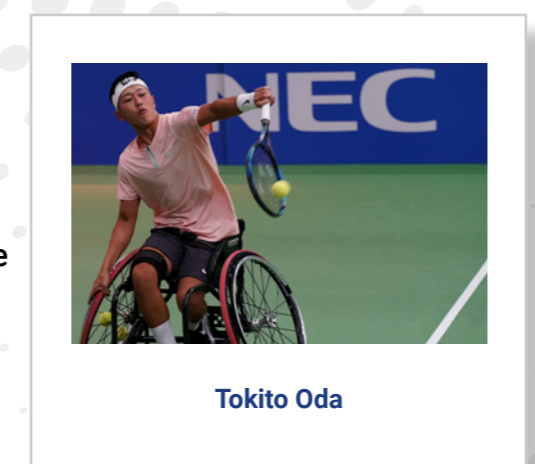
Niels Vink and Sam Schroder have dominated the 2023 season at the top of the quad singles rankings, winning two Grand Slam titles apiece, while Vink has won all five of this year's Super Series titles. Between them they have contested the last two quad finals at the Singles Masters, while Schroder denied Vink back-to-back Singles Masters titles last year and it will likely

take a big performance from any of their six rivals to stop them from making it an all-Dutch final again.

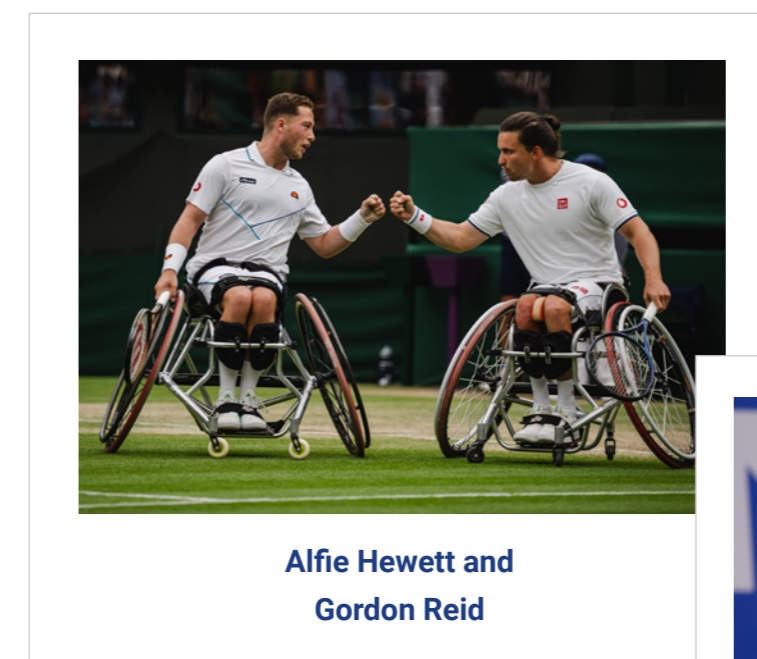
World No.1 Vink's position at the top of the quad singles world rankings at the end of the year is secure. He is set to arrive in Barcelona having won 10 singles titles in 12 tournament this season. The only two tournaments he's not won have resulted in Schroder's Grand Slam titles at the Australian Open and the US Open.

While 2023 has largely

consisted of Schroder finishing runner-up to Vink on multiple occasions, the season has also included losses to Heath Davidson in the Wimbledon semi-finals, to Masters debutant Guy Sasson in the quarter-finals of the French Riviera Open and to 11-time Singles Masters champion David Wagner in the final of the Seoul Korea Open. Davidson, Sasson and Wagner should all be live contenders for a place in this year's semi-finals, along with Schroder and Vink.

Next to Vink's 10 titles, Sasson

four titles this year include three on clay, including at the Barcelona Open. Meanwhile, former Masters finalist Andy Lapthorne, Ronald Ramphadi and Koji Sugeno have all been Grand Slam semifinalists in 2023 and the round-round group matches should be an intriguing prospect.

Olympic snowboarding and skateboarding star. At 15, he became the youngest Japanese medalist ever at the Winter Olympics. Gold medalist for snowboarding at the 2022 Beijing Olympics.



**ADAM SCOTT**

World-class golfer with 14 PGA Tour wins. First Australian to take the Masters Tournament, right after becoming a Uniqlo Global Brand Ambassador. Former No.1 world-ranked player.

# DOUBLES MASTERS PREVIEW

The ITF Wheelchair Doubles Masters follows almost the same format as the NEC Wheelchair Singles Masters, with the top two partnerships after the round-robin matches progressing to the men's and women's doubles semi-finals, while the top two teams after the quad doubles round-robin qualify for the quad doubles final.

## MEN'S DOUBLES

Twelve months ago, Martin de la Puente secured the year-end No. 1 doubles ranking after he partnered Gustavo Fernandez to win the men's Doubles Masters title and with the Masters being held in Spain for the first time, there is nothing that De la Puente would like more than to successfully defend the title in front his home crowd.

De la Puente and Fernandez are set to arrive in Barcelona having won two ITF 1 titles together this season, both on clay at the Belgian Open and the Swiss Open, while their best Grand Slam performance came when finishing runners-up to Alfie Hewett and Gordon Reid in two close sets in the Roland Garros final.

Already two-time Doubles

Masters champions together, Hewett and Reid have also beaten De la Puente and Fernandez in two Super Series finals in 2023, while the Brits have extended their Grand Slam record to 18 titles together. However, their bid for a second calendar Grand Slam came to an end at the US Open, where they were beaten in the semi-finals by eventual champions Stephane Houdet and Takashi Sanada.

Houdet and Sanada team up with different partners in Barcelona. Houdet resumes a highly successful partnership with fellow Frenchman Frederic Cattano that goes back more than 20 years, and which has brought one ITF 2 title this season, along with runners-up honours to De la Puente and Fernandez at the Swiss Open and to Dutch duo Tom Egberink and Ruben Spaargaren at

the Sardinia Open. There are form lines aplenty among the eight men's doubles partnerships. With 2022 Doubles Masters finalists and reigning Sardinia Open champions Egberink and Spaargaren having been forced to withdraw from this year's event, Joachim Gerard and Maikel Scheffers, who lost out to Egberink and Spaargaren in the last four in Sardinia, are still likely to be strong contenders for a place in the last four.

Takuya Miki and Tokito Oda have made an impressive case for themselves in just three tournaments together after winning the Japan Open and reaching the finals of both Wimbledon and the US Open this year, while Australian Open semi-finalists Daisuke Arai and Sanada boost the Japanese challenge.



## WOMEN'S DOUBLES

You have to go back to 2014 to find a championship-winning women's partnership at the Doubles Masters that does not include either Diede de Groot, Jiske Griffioen or Aniek van Koot. However, De Groot and Griffioen have never won the Doubles Masters title together.

They will attempt to do just that this year after pairing up together in June for their first tournament outside of World Team Cup competition. That was at the French Riviera Open, where they endured their only loss as a partnership, losing out in the final to Yui Kamiji and Kgothatso Montjane. Since then, De Groot and Griffioen have won three titles and are unbeaten in completed matches.

Kamiji and Montjane benefited from De Groot and Griffioen having to award a walkover ahead of the US Open final and the Japanese-South African partnership are now the owners of two Grand Slam titles after beating De Groot and Argentina's Maria Florenca Moreno in this year's Roland Garros final.

Kamiji and Montjane have built a flourishing doubles partnership that began on clay at the Barcelona Open in June 2022.

They've now won eight titles together, six of which have come on clay. The only tournament they've played together and not reached the final was 2022 Doubles Masters.

Of the other partnerships among this year's Doubles Masters entries, Kamiji and Montjane have twice beaten French duo Pauline Derouledé and Emmanuelle Morch this season, while also defeating Manami Tanaka and Zhenzhen Zhu in the final of the Open International de Royan.

Tanaka and Zhu have an admirable record as doubles partners. In 14 tournaments together since February 2022 they've only failed to reach the final on three occasions, winning nine titles at ITF 1 or ITF 2 level.

Derouledé and Morch won the first of three tournaments as a partnership earlier this year, while Van Koot and Lizzy de Greef, the second all-Dutch partnership, pair up in Barcelona for the very first time.

Dana Mathewson and Lucy Shuker's Belgian Open title in July was their second ITF 1 title of the year and with Mathewson likely playing the last

Masters of her career this year, she and Shuker will hope to improve on their two previous Doubles Masters semi-final appearances in 2017 and 2021 2021.

## QUAD DOUBLES

The four partnerships who will contend for a place in the quad doubles final have varying degrees of experience with their respective partners.

Dutch top seeds Sam Schroder and Nies Vink have enjoyed another dominant season and arrive in Barcelona having won nine titles and 25 of their 26 matches in all competition. However, the defending champions lost out to Andy Lapthorne and Donald Ramphadi in the Roland Garros semi-finals.

Lapthorne will end 2023 as he started it, pairing up with David Wagner. The Anglo-American duo have an impressive resume, having won the first of their six Grand Slam titles together at the 2014 Australian Open. However, their 2023 record to date has not been so successful and they lost all three of their early-season matches against 2022 Doubles Masters finalists Robert Shaw and Heath Davidson.

Winners of the career Grand Slam together, Lapthorne and Wagner undoubtedly have the experience to beat any of their opponents in the round-robin phase of the competition. Meanwhile, Davidson and Shaw approach the end of their second full season as

a regular doubles partners having earned a place in all five Super Series finals alongside Schroder and Vink, their first Grand Slam final at Roland Garros and a trio of ITF 1 titles.

With just seven tournaments behind them as a partnership, Tomas Masaryk and Ymanitu Silva are the least experienced team contesting this year's ITF Doubles Masters as Masaryk makes his debut at the year-end championship. Nevertheless, they have already built a noteworthy bank of results, including winning their first four tournaments together.

# Emilio Sánchez Vicario Foundation

The ITF Wheelchair FESV, more than a decade with a fixed appointment in the national and international calendar.

The ITF Wheelchair FESV Tournament was born in 2012 at Emilio Sánchez Academy to give opportunities to those Spanish tennis players for their qualification for the Paralympic Games. This tournament has been consolidated with the support of the Catalan Federation, it is the current Catalonia Open, thus joining the Madrid event (La Ciudad de la Raqueta) on the calendar.

**The starting point. Wheelchair Tennis School in the National Hospital for Paraplegics in Toledo.**

The Emilio Sánchez Vicario Foundation began its project at the National Hospital for Paraplegics in January 2012, creating a school to promote sport with wheelchair tennis for patients admitted to the hospital, as well as for external people suffering from spinal cord injuries. Between 50 and 60 patients a year participate in the school each season.

**The resources, the competition, the opportunity.**



Emilio Sánchez Vicario, aware of the positive values that sport in general and tennis in particular contribute to people's development, created the Foundation in 2010 to promote tennis among people with physical, intellectual or sensory disabilities, as well as people with limited economic resources.

We currently have schools in Barcelona, Madrid, Toledo and Sevilla, as well as the Casper Tour circuit to support grassroots tennis and which is a sports and social integration project, as it includes the organization of tennis schools to promote the sport and in parallel open schools in clubs for young players undergoing cancer treatment, in those cities where the Casper Circuit events are held.

**AmplificArte, by the Princess of Girona Foundation with support from the Emilio Sánchez Vicario Foundation.**

The first stop in Barcelona of the Talent Tour, under the Art House label of the Princess of Girona Foundation, was at the Emilio Sánchez Academy & American School, with the support of the Emilio Sánchez Vicario Foundation, and in which the young artists Teo and Riza delighted nearly 120 student-athletes.

The live performances are part of AmplificARTE, an educational project that uses music as a transversal discipline and "a tool to work on the personal development and emotional well-being of young people", while promoting musical culture in schools, social entities and other spaces.

# Catalan Tennis Foundation

The Catalan Tennis Foundation's main objective is to encourage and promote tennis at all social levels and places in the Catalan territory, giving priority to groups of people with disabilities and people at risk of social exclusion.

The areas of work and specific projects with which the Foundation currently works are wheelchair tennis, blind tennis, tennis for people with intellectual disabilities, tennis and special educational needs at school age, tennis and mental health and tennis in prisons. In all cases, the methodology used is global and inclusive to

adapt the tasks and activities to the aptitudes of the program practitioners.

- Learning the basics of tennis adapted to the possibilities of execution to acquire a minimum of autonomy in the practice of tennis.
- Participation in fun and recreational activities with an educational orientation.
- Participation in meetings with other players from different tennis schools.

It can be accessed by anyone who, according to their doctor, has stabilized all their physical sequelae and who wants to practice sports supervised by the various specialized technicians.

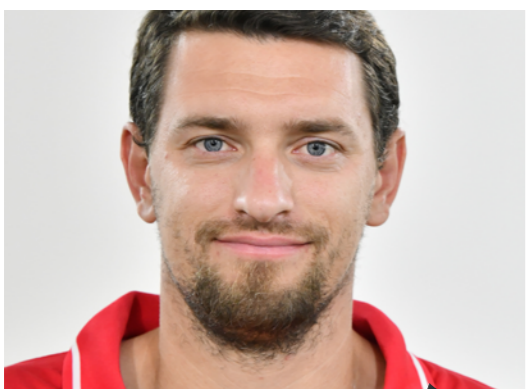

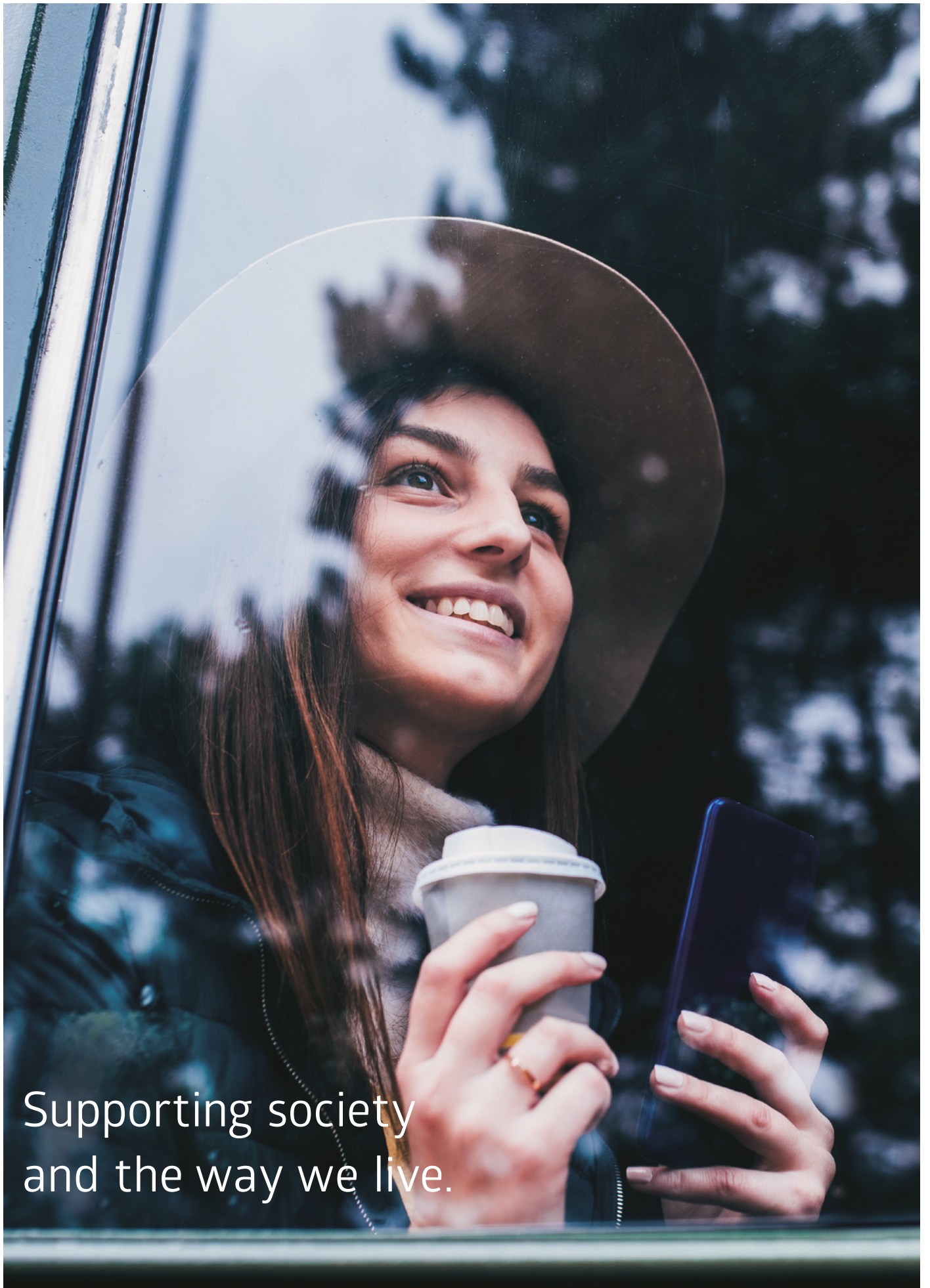
